Virtual Backgrounds is happy to announce that we can now extend offers to customers to have their digital files made into background slides. Every slide will be mounted on glass-mounted square super slides. If you wish to have a 35mm slide instead of the perfect square, simply create a square canvas, insert your 35mm image, and fill in the remaining area with the color black. It's that easy! Slides are priced at \$10 each with a minimum \$50 order.

Digital files can be uploaded as jpeg images through our FTP transfer page located in the "Background Libraries" section of the website. It is recommended that files are sent as jpg images with pixel dimensions of 2000 x 2000. Have Fun Capturing Your Own Backgrounds!

Virtual Backgrounds has more than 1000 stock background slides available. The stock slides are a great way for a new user of a Virtual Backgrounds system to quickly get started. There are many other stock slides such as The Simone Collections and Old Masters backgrounds that should be part of every photographers background library. The real fun of using your Virtual Backgrounds system, however, is in capturing your own backgrounds.

In some ways, it's a whole lot like a fishing or hunting trip. You never know what you are going to find. But, every time you venture forth, whether it is just down the road a piece or off to other cities and countries, you should carry your film or digital camera with you to capture the backgrounds that catch your attention.

I make it a practice to always look at nearly everything in my environment, trying to anticipate how I would use that background in the studio with real subjects. Backgrounds can be of anything. Initially, you'll just look for special places where, if you lived in the area, would want to take your subjects to be photographed. As your experience grows, you'll come to realize that you are able to make big things little and little things big. Even silly objects can be valuable captures. I was recently traveling across Germany on an ICE train. We stopped in the Frankfurt station, and I was attracted to the domed ceiling with thousands of glass panels sloping up and over with a blue sky behind the panels. I captured it...and it made a great abstract background that is made even better when I vary the image with color gels. On the same trip, I

passed very close to an old rusty factory with big beams and other pipes. With the current interest in industrial backgrounds, I grabbed that image too.

I now use my digital camera to capture all my backgrounds. It costs nothing to grab a background. Then, when I have time, I look through what I captured and find the keepers and erase the others. It's kind of like being a shrimper. You drop nets and then pull them in and sort through your catch. With digital cameras and programs such as Photo Shop, you can perform an infinite number of manipulations too!

Sometimes one or more unusable images can be made into something really special when combined together and enhanced.

I find that when I use images that I captured myself in the studio with a real subject, I feel as though I am back at the location. And when I return to a site where I captured backgrounds, perhaps years earlier, I have a unique feeling that I've been there many times over. Once in a while, I return to a site that yielded really great backgrounds only to find that the location has been re-decorated. Very often, it is possible to re-photograph the same site but with entirely different results.

So, you see, capturing your own backgrounds and utilizing them creatively in the studio can be loads of fun. It personalizes your work and your style, and it gives your customers that special "something different" that they desire.


Monte Zucker Scheduled to Appear at WPPI Trade Show

In Less Than One Year, Angela is Looking to Expand Her Studio!

Angela Vaught opened her studio in Somerset, Kentucky less than a year ago and already she is looking for a larger facility to accommodate her growing needs. While Photography by Angela Vaught is Angela's first studio, she is not new to professional photography. She was with Sears Portraits for 17 years doing everything from running the local Sears Portrait Studio to working as a training manager which took her all over the country. Eventually, she grew frustrated with the limitations a major national studio chain has to impose on their photographers and decided to follow her dream of having her own studio. Although Angela does all kinds of photography, her specialty is children 5 and under. Angela's first major purchase after







purchasing her Canon 10 D camera and studio lights was a Virtual Backgrounds system. 
